July transition

From the School Office

As we approach the end of the school year, please check your child's dinner money account and settle any arrears.

It is really important that children bring a named sunhat and water bottle to school each day and please apply sun cream every morning. Groups are spending as much time as possible outside during this lovely weather. We also ask that children bring one small fruit/veg snack if they are not staying for lunch. No toys, books or other items should be brought to school. Please ensure your child's bag only has the required items each day.

We continue to be very impressed with the effort that the children have been putting into their home learning. We would like to celebrate this by showcasing more of the brilliant pieces of home learning we have received below.


