Expenditure for the academic year 2018/19	
We received £ 17125 for the academic year 2018/19 based on £16000 plus £10 per pupil in Years 1-6	
Out of this allocation we used:-	
 £11000 to update the timber trail equipment on the playground which provides children with access to equipment to use during break times, lunchtimes and during PE sessions. The equipment was also used as an activity station for all children during our Sports Day £5260 (28% of the total allocation) for the use of a sports specialist from Perins to come in for a day and work with all classes from Year R to 6 each week – further enhancing subject knowledge for staffespecially those new to the school Transport to all the sports events we have taken part in-total cost for the year was £1800 	Continue with this involvement for classes from September- working with new staff and providing opportunities for interhouse events
Achievements for the Year	
Increased participation in competitive sports events- both within school and the 7AS- over the year we have used our Sports specialist to plan and implement inter house events throughout the year so that all Year groups from Years 1-6 have taken part in 3 different interhouse Level 1 competitions throughout the year	To continue to provide at least termly opportunities for the children to join together for interhouse competitions within school and continue with our involvement with the 7AS so that over the course of the year each year group from Year 1-6 have the opportunity to participate in at least 1 Level 2 event
In addition to this 100% of Year groups 3 to 6 took part in at least 2 additional sporting opportunities throughout the year. All children in KS2 were invited to take part in the 7AS area sports event.	
Year 3 children attended the 7AS Rugby day, were introduced to a new sport-Cricket —through being taken to Serious Cricket for a taster afternoon and	
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taking part in a cricket taster session in school through All Stars cricket. All the Year 3 girls took part in the 7AS Netball development day.

All of the Year 4 children all took part in the 7AS athletics development day at Perins.

In Year 5 71% of the cohort took part in either the 7AS netball or football tournament and in Year 6 100% took part in either football, basketball or netball.

These additional sporting opportunities contributed to us being awarded the School Games Gold Mark for the fourth consecutive year in June 2019 in recognition of our commitment to providing sporting opportunities for children.

Increased levels of physical activity- the whole school have access to the Timber trail on the playground- each class uses it on a rota basis during break times and it is also used during PE for warm ups and as an activity station during Sports Day

From the start of the academic year the whole school joined together twice a week during break times to take part in the Golden Mile- all children on roll since September achieved their 10 mile certificate with 45 children in the school achieving their silver certificate for 25 miles by June 2019.

During the last academic year 63% of KS2 children have participated in at least 1 of the extra curricular clubs offered with 24% attending 2 or more clubs. This high level has contributed to us being awarded the Gold Mark again for this year.

In addition to KS2 the KS1 clubs we have continued to offer are very well attended with 65% of KS1 children having taken part in at least 1 club.

The percentage of children (32%) in KS2 running sports activities for other children also contributed towards the Gold Level School Games Mark being achieved as the children in Year 5 and 6 are playleaders and organize games and physical activities for the rest of the school to be engaged with.

Reapply for the Gold Mark again in the next academic year- Summer 2020

Timber trail to be installed on the field to be used in the same way

Look into developing a Golden Mile track around the school so that the Golden Mile can be run all year round and the track used as part of PE sessions and extra curricular clubs too-possibly incorporating additional challenges around the track- such as small structures to jump over

Continue to look to offer a wide range of sports clubs throughout the year for children to be able to take part in







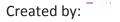
