There are many different ways to celebrate People who are religious will use different ways to celebrate too Christians celebrate the food they have at Harvest time in the Autumn At Harvest, many Christians go to church to celebrate in a special Harvest service They sing songs, pray and often give to charity to help others without food. The word God is a name. Christians believe God is Creator of the universe. Christians believe God made our wonderful world and so we should look after it.		Candles are used to remember someone or something A Hannukiah is a special Jewish menorah lamp to remind Jews of the miracle of the oil at Hanukkah It has 9 candles, one for each night of the 8 nights of the festival of Hanukkah plus a helper candle The festival of Hannukah celebrates the belief in the miracle of one small jar of oil lasting 8 nights instead of 1 night as usual Christians also use light at Christmas An example is the Advent ring/wreath which has 4 candles A candle is lit on each of the 4 Sundays leading up to Christmas It reminds Christians to wait and prepare for Christmas light Christians believe God came to Earth in human form as Jesus . Christians believe Jesus came to show that all people are precious and special to God .		Christians believe that Jesus changed people's lives when he met them. There are 3 stories in the gospels that we have learnt that show this Zacchaeus the tax collector was hated by people because of his job. He changed when he met Jesus and gave back what he had stolen from others Jairus' daughter was brought back to life by Jesus and Jairus changed by believing in Jesus and following him afterwards Jesus brought sight back to the blind man and the man had faith that Jesus could do this. Christians use these stories to show that Jesus can change the lives of anyone who believes in him. Christians believe Jesus brings good news for all people . For Christians, this good news includes being loved by God, and being forgiven for bad things. Christians believe Jesus is a friend to the poor and friendless . Christians believe Jesus' teachings make people think hard about how to live and show them the right way.		The Seder plate helps Jews remember a special story called the Passover The story of the Passover is found in the Torah , the first five books of the Hebrew scriptures It is remembered at a special festival of Passover each year Passover tells the story of how Jews were led out of Egypt and slavery by Moses The Seder meal has special foods in it to help remember parts of the story: bitter herbs, a lamb bone, celery or parsley, paste made of fruit and nuts and a hard boiled egg		Stories are told in all religions Stories help religious people to remember important teachings as well as the lives of important people Christians tell the story of Saul on the road to Damascus to show how he came to believe in Jesus and stopped hurting Christians Christians tell the story of St Christopher to show how he helped travellers and why some Christians pray to him today Christians tell the story of Paul (who was called Saul before he became a Christian) and Silas to show their faith in prison. Children will also learn about a story in one other religion and why it is important.		We all belong to different communities There are always people who may need help in any community Dāna is a very important value in Hindu traditions Dāna involves helping people without expecting anything in return The story of Karna's generosity shows the value of generosity to others

The word Belongings can be used to describe the physical property that is owned by somebody (literal) or to describe the feeling of being included (abstract) How having belongings and the feeling of belonging affects their lives God created the universe. The Earth and everything in it are important to God. God has a unique relationship with human beings as their Creator and Sustainer. Humans should care for the world because it belongs to God. Many Christians feels a sense of belonging when visiting the Church (God's House) The sense of belonging is important to feel safe, secure and happy.		Advent is a special time of waiting for Christmas for Christians Advent lasts for four weeks leading up to Christmas Day the word <i>advent</i> means "to come" and refers to the birth of Jesus During Advent, many Christians may go to church more, pray more, make a wreath or Christingle or doing something that helps them to prepare for Christmas Advent helps Christians think about the birth of Jesus and look forward to it Christians believe that Jesus is God and that he was born as a baby in Bethlehem . The Bible points out that his birth showed that he was extraordinary (for example, he is worshipped as a king, in Matthew) and that he came to bring good news (for example, to the poor, in Luke).		Purim is a Jewish festival that takes place each year in the Spring It reminds the Jewish people of their rescue long ago when they were threatened with being killed It tells the story of Esther who was Jewish and was the Persian king's wife She rescued her people through her cleverness The Book of Esther is read at the festival and a feast is held, as well as giving gifts to others		A symbol is something that stands for something else, an idea or value for example The cross is a very important symbol for Christians It symbolizes the death and resurrection of Jesus and the belief in life after death for Christians There are many different types of crosses each with a different emphasis – for example the empty cross emphasizing the resurrection and the crucifix showing the suffering of Jesus Easter is very important in the 'big story' of the Bible. Jesus showed that he was willing to forgive all people, even for putting him on the cross. Christians believe Jesus builds a bridge between God and humans. Christians believe Jesus rose from the dead, giving people hope of a new life.		A ritual is a religious or solemn ceremony that has actions completed in a certain order for meaning Christians use food in a ritual called the Eucharist The Eucharist is also known as Holy Communion Bread and wine are used in the Eucharist to remind Christians of Jesus' last supper For some Christians the bread and wine are a symbol of Jesus' body and blood, for others it is the actual body and blood The Old Testament tells the story of a particular group of people, the children of Israel — known as the People of God — and their relationship with God. The People of God try to live in the way God wants, following his commands and worshipping him. They believe he promises to stay with them and Bible stories show how God		Christians believe in one God. and that they find out about God in the Bible. They talk about him as God the father and will pray to him as a father (worship) and try to live in ways that please him . They also believe that God has 3 persons; God as father, Son and Holy Spirit Christians describe God in hymns, prayers, stories and other ways as powerful, protective of those who follow him and loving Christians believe God is loving, kind, fair and also Lord and King; and there are some stories that show this. Hindus believe in one eternal spirit, Brahman Brahman is one, but has many different aspects These are shown in the different Hindu Gods and Goddesses

<p>Temptation means there is a desire or a want to do something. It is hard to resist temptation and easy to give in</p> <p>There are moral implications associated with temptations- what is the right or wrong thing to do</p> <p>How Christians say the Lord's Prayer as a way of asking God to help lead them not into temptation and can describe how this helps Christians to do the right thing</p> <p>The Old Testament pieces together the story of the people of God. As their circumstances change (for example, from being nomads (Abraham, Jacob) to being city dwellers (David)), they have to learn new ways of following God. The story of Moses and the Exodus shows how God rescued his people from slavery in Egypt; Christians see this story as looking forward to how Jesus' death and resurrection also rescue people from slavery to sin.</p>		<p>Holy means someone or something dedicated to God</p> <p>For many Christians, Mary is an example of a Holy person, because she obeys God always and is the mother of Jesus, the Son of God</p> <p>Catholic Christians especially have statues, stained glass, hymns and prayers that are directed to Mary as a very important Holy person</p> <p>Artwork about Mary often shows her as Holy (for example, by using a halo) and as the mother of Jesus</p> <p>Christians believe Jesus is one of the three persons of the Trinity: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.</p> <p>Christians believe the Father creates; he sends the Son who saves his people; the Son sends the Holy Spirit to his followers. There are many practices and beliefs that help Muslims belong to their religion The Five Pillars of Islam are an important way of helping Muslims all over the world belong to their religion The Five Pillars are declaring your faith in Allah , prayer, charity, fasting in the month of Ramadan and going on a pilgrimage to Mecca (if you are able to) Observing these helps create a sense of belonging for a Muslim Shahada and Salat are important parts of the Islamic faith		Jesus was Jewish. Christians believe Jesus is God in the flesh. This belief is called the Incarnation They believe that his birth, life, death and resurrection were part of a longer plan by God to restore the relationship between humans and God. The Old Testament talks about a 'rescuer' or 'anointed one' — a messiah . Some texts talk about what this 'messiah' would be like. Christians believe that Jesus fulfilled these expectations, and that he is the Messiah. (Jewish people do not think Jesus is the Messiah.) Christians see Jesus as their Saviour (see Salvation) . The birth narratives show that Jesus was the Son of God yet also human Different aspects of the birth narratives highlight this, for example the coming of the		There are many practices and beliefs that help Muslims find peace in their religion The Arabic word salaam (secured, pacified, submitted) has the same root as the word Islam One Islamic interpretation is that individual personal peace is attained by utterly submitting to Allah . The greeting As-Salaamu alaykum , favoured by Muslims, has the literal meaning Peace be upon you . Many Muslims therefore believe that it is possible to attain personal <i>peace</i> through prayer and submitting to Allah and his will. Sawm (the fasting during Ramadam) Meditation is another way some people from different faiths find inner peace	The resurrection of Jesus is a central Christian belief Christians believe that death is not to be feared Christians believe that Jesus' resurrection has opened up the possibility of eternal life for them The belief in the resurrection is shown in many ways by Christians, for example using an empty cross, words in hymns, Christian writings and the focus on new life at Easter Christians read the ' big story ' of the Bible as pointing out the need for God to save people. This salvation includes the ongoing restoration of humans' relationship with God. The Gospels give accounts of Jesus' death and resurrection . The New Testament says that Jesus' death was somehow 'for us'. Christians interpret this in a variety of ways:		Christian beliefs about life after death are based around their belief in the death and resurrection of Jesus Many Christians believe that when they die, they will have life in Heaven Christians will hold a funeral to come together and to give thanks for someone's life The funeral will often be in a church There will be prayers, readings from the Bible and hymns sung Jesus told many parables about the Kingdom of God . These suggest that God's rule has begun, through the life, teaching and example of Jesus, and subsequently through the lives of Christians who live in obedience to God. The parables suggest that there will be a future Kingdom, where God's reign will be complete. The Kingdom is compared to a feast where all are invited to	They will recap the difference between a ritual and a routine from previous years Eid-Ul-Fitr marks the end of the holy month of Ramadan and is celebrated by the Muslim community across the globe. Eid-Ul-Fitr, also known as Meethi Eid , marks the end of Roza (fast) , which is observed during the whole month of Ramadan. On Eid-Ul-Fitr, Muslims thank Allah for offering them health and resistance during Ramadan. They wear new clothes, prepare special delicacies, do charity, and get together with their loved ones. This festival is observed on the first day of Shawwal - the month that comes after Ramadan in the Hijri calendar.

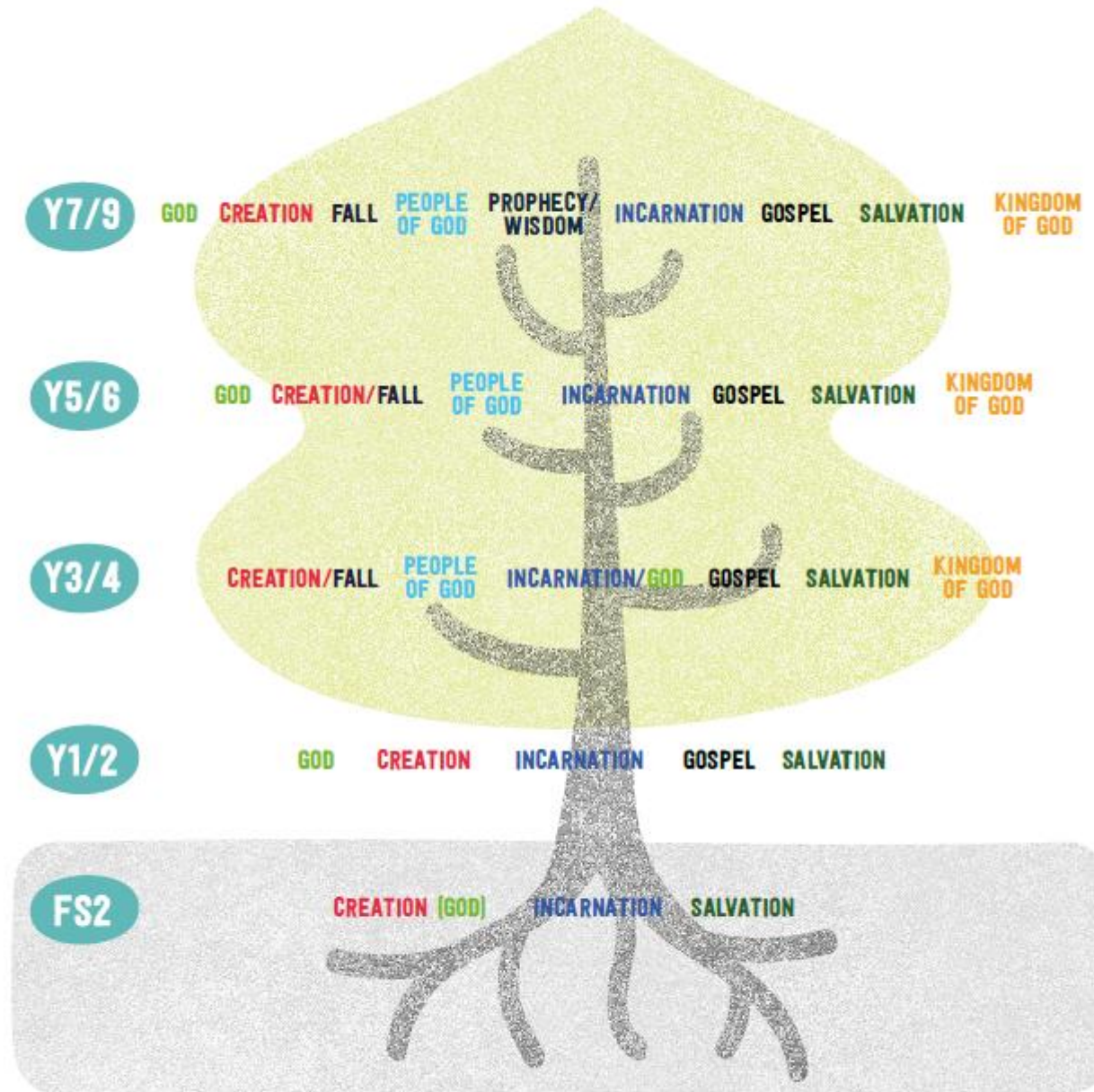

Christians remember Jesus' sacrifice through the service of Holy Communion (also called the Lord's Supper, the Eucharist or the Mass). Belief in Jesus' resurrection confirms to Christians that Jesus is the incarnate Son of God, but also that death is not the end. This belief gives Christians hope for life with God, starting now and continuing in a new life (heaven). Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others, and some are prepared to die for others and for their faith.</p>	<p>join in. Not everyone chooses to do so. Many Christians try to extend the Kingdom of God by challenging unjust social structures in their locality and in the world.</p>
